### Red Cross Aids Survivors of Devastating Tornadoes

In mid-December, a band of deadly tornadoes tore through parts of the South and Midwest, leveling homes, businesses and entire communities. In the weeks since the tornadoes struck, dedicated American Red Cross volunteers and employees have been working tirelessly with our partners to provide nourishing meals, safe refuge, critical relief supplies and emotional support to thousands of people whose lives have been forever changed by this heartbreaking disaster. <sup>4</sup>Management, general and fundraising expenses support our work at its core and are indispensable to running the organization and helping people in need. They include the people and systems to maintain our enterprise-wide computer and telecommunications, HR and payroll systems to support more than 17,000 employees and nearly 300,000 volunteers, fundraising and communications functions, and other support services across all program lines. 90 cents of every dollar spent for the Southern and Midwest Tornadoes will support delivering care and comfort to help people affected by these storms.

<sup>5</sup>As of January 10, 2022, we estimate that we will spend \$41.6 million for the Southern and Midwest Tornadoes. Kentucky Tornadoes donations are supporting the response in Kentucky, and Southern and Midwest Tornadoes donations are supporting all responses across impacted states. This response also includes specific expenses expected to be reimbursed by the state of Kentucky.
